LEARNING SEQUENCE Description Time

INTO

Introduction/Motivation/Focus Attention

- Tell students that we are going to practice figuring out what syllable you stress when prononuncing it.
- Ask the students why they think it is important to know this. Awnsers will vary but should include reasons such as, so you will say it correctly, so others can understand you.

Description Time 10-15 mins

THROUGH

Learning Activities (Input, Modeling, Check for Understanding, Guided Practice, Independent Practice)

- Break the students into groups of two or three, and hand each group an envelope contating various words.
- Tell the students to work as a group to determine where the stress goes in the word, and to break the words up into groups based on that.
- Tell students that they cannot use a dictionary. But to use the skills we talked about over the last few days to determine where the stress is put.
- After groups have tried on their own, have them come up to the Sort Bin, and get the awnser sheet for their enevelop and to check their awnsers.

Closure (Review/Check for Understanding/Summarize/Future forecast/Transition)

- Ask students what were some of the methods they used that helped them to figure out where the stress is in a word
- Have the students try a different envelope if time permits.
